Master's Dinner at the Liberal Club and Annual Banquet at the new Haberdashers Hall with principal guest, the Commander of HMS Scott.


City Profile and Awareness Activities

Wider Awareness Raising

On 30th October the Company accepted its first conference invitation to speak, the event being "Water 2003 - What can be done?" before over 200 people at the Royal Geographical Society. The post conference dinner, hosted by ourselves, had the Water Minister as principal guest, with other key guests such as Lord Hunt, previously in charge of the Met. A Lords Reception Office. followed a month later with the conference outputs forming part of the Government's inputs to Kyoto this March.

This activity heralds us entering a further new area of wider awareness raising through three upcoming prestigious lectures. These are aimed at Livery, City and Business/Politician audiences to show that as a Company we are both forward thinking and very relevant to the 'City'.

Insurance Hall will be the venue for a business/community consequence lecture on the Barrier re: Increasing future flooding challenges, a City venue for a lecture on managing the escalating pressures of refuse/solid waste from London as a major conurbation and thirdly, closing the loop back to "the great stink" of over a century ago (at the House of Commons) showing how clean rivers are vital to a major prestigious capital.

Recognising the need for wider scope, but always differentiated

and special social events, two of the four most supported ideas will be offered for later in the year May to August. Depending on firm responses, a further more geographically distant event using our Company connections will be offered.

As I've said previously, having gained the Livery, the Wardens and myself have to ensure we move forwards on a sound basis delivering our agreed goals of fellowship and with the purpose of positive awareness raising, all in a fun context. Whilst direction and consistency are more important than pace, demonstrable progress is however vital if we're to secure the Company desire to be viewed as relevant, important, professional and, above all, pleasant to engage with.

I will strive to ensure that the second half of my year as Master continues to move us forwards, both externally and internally, reflecting also the new Lord Mayor's desire of ensuring relevance of the Livery with a clarity of good governance.

Courtesy of the Queen's Watermen, my wife Angela and I joined the clerk Ralph Riley and the deputy bargemaster, David Cowie, in a private enclosure with around fifty other livery company guests. The delightfully named Swan-Uppers who mark the Queen's swans on the Thames were also present.

The Queen's Watermen - the majority of whom are also members of the Company of Watermen and Lightermen - had organised a special event to present the Queen with a model of her beautiful new Thames barge, aptly named Jubilant.

Fresh from success in the Admiral's Cup, our Company's cutter, the Water Forget-Me-Not, on this occasion served its purpose out of the water alongside the barges of other Livery Companies as part of a colourful procession. Together with the Masters of the Founders', Tallow Chandlers', Master Mariners' and Shipwrights' Companies amongst others, we all stood dressed in our robes and regalia to form an avenue to receive the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh as they visited our enclosure.

Despite being on a whirlwind tour of the day's events, Her Majesty duly spoke to a few of the guests before being presented with the model of the Jubilant. It truly was a hugely memorable day and a wonderful high on which to finish my term as Master.

The Company congratulates, with pleasure, the Queen's Bargemaster Bob Crouch - a good friend of the Company - being honoured in the New Year's Honours List and is now a Member of the Royal Victorian Order.

The Journeyman Cometh

At its meeting in December 2002, and after deliberation for a year or more, the Court agreed to launch an initiative to attract younger qualified members to join the Company.

They felt the need to lower the average age of membership, and to ensure that we have a healthy succession. These new, younger members are to be known as Journeymen, the Livery's traditional name for its up and coming Freemen.

In order to make the proposition attractive, it was agreed that the cost for Journeymen should be kept to a minimum.

The Court therefore agreed that the conditions for membership of the Company as a Journeyman will be as follows:-

- The class of Journeyman shall be open to professionally qualified individuals from the age of 25 years, to the age of 40 years.
- Membership as a Journeyman shall be by invitation (in line with a Freeman).
- A Journeyman shall be qualified, either by dint of corporate membership of an appropriate professional body, or possession of a relevant higher degree.
- A Journeyman shall not be admitted to the Freedom of the Company, but be "a member" of it.
- A Journeyman shall pay an entrance fine equal to that of a Freeman.
- The Journeyman's entrance fine

shall include the cost of the provision of a Tear badge with an identifying ribbon (also in line with a Feeman).

- A Journeyman shall pay the same quarterage as a Freeman.
- A Journeyman shall be entitled to attend the Michaelmas Lunch, Election Court Lunch and Installation Lunch/Dinner as a Company guest, and without further payment.
- A Journeyman shall be entitled to attend all other Company events and to invite guests to all Company functions, provided that the Journeyman does so at his / her own expense.
- A Journeyman may remain as such for a maximum period of five years, or until reaching the age of 40 years, which ever occurs the sooner.
- After five years of membership, or having reached the age of 40 years, a Journeyman shall: either apply for the Freedom of the Company; or apply to join the Livery of the Company, (subject to payment of the livery fine and quarterage); or revert to non-active status.

All existing Freemen and Liverymen of the Company are now encouraged to consider proposing suitable younger members either from their own organisations, or those with whom they are associated through business and whom they know well, to become Journeymen Water Conservators.

All members of the company are entitled to have lunch at the City Livery Club at the Insurers' Hall, Aldermanbury, behind the Guildhall. The Club has a bar, provides a hot lunch or sandwiches and as those who attend the Past Masters' lunch will verify, the food is excellent. It is also a good spot if you are in the city at lunchtime or are looking for a venue for a family party following the award of Freeman of the City, for example.

City Livery Club

Members of the Company are entitled to join the City Livery Club to benefit from their dining facilities, coffee lounge and join in a number of functions including an annual banquet and holiday. It is possible to join any or all of the different sections which include aero, golf, music and boating. Each has its own separate functions and weekends away.

United Wards Club

The United Wards Club is open to membership for anybody interested in the City - whether or not they are a Freeman, Liveryman or ward club member. A number of functions and holidays are arranged including a trip this year to Slovenia and Venice.

Guild of Freemen

Open to all Freemen and Liverymen, the Guild of Freemen

is a purely social organisation which has numerous functions in the City during the year. These include a visit with a reception and lunch and an annual banquet which attracts over 1,000 to the Guildhall.

Society of Young Freemen

Any Freemen under the age of 36 are entitled to join this society which provides a number of social events such as City brewery visits.

Royal Society of St George, City of London branch

A number of events including an annual banquet at the Mansion House and functions including a Trafalgar Night Dinner and Beating, Retreat make this the organisation to belong to if you are particularly patriotic.

The prizes, certificates and goblets have been a great success here too. A tremendous start!

The Company is now focused on developing its role to follow the best traditions of the Livery. A large part of that role has historically been to support education and training, and our new livery company is keen to play its part, whilst at the same time promoting water conservation in its widest sense.

After much discussion within the Court, and also with the trustees of our charity, The Water Conservation Trust, it was decided follow the path of the majority of the City livery companies, and establish develop links with schools. We have therefore initiated this pilot scheme with a few selected schools across the UK, and we look forward to being involved with more events like this.

When the pilot study is completed, it is intended to launch it Company and country wide, and invite members of the livery to become a School Water Conservators, and for them to develop a link with a school in their locality, or a school with which they or their family are associated.

Joint carol service

Service of dedication and Myddleton Lunch

It was fitting that the momentous dedication of our Livery Company was celebrated in honour of an historic water pioneer.

In the early 1600s, Sir Hugh Myddleton ran the New River Company and built a watercourse bringing life-saving, fresh water from Hertfordshire into the City of London.

In recognition of his achievement, the Company chose to mark its third anniversary of gaining Livery status- and celebrate the official dedication - by holding the Myddleton Lunch on January 27th 2003. The event began with the historic dedication of the livery in St Michael's Cornhill church. This traditional ceremony was modelled on the ancient traditions of the many other livery Companies.

Fortunately the winter weather was mild and the Court was able to process from the Tallow Chandlers' Hall to the church and back. Over 90 members gathered for a sumptuous meal.

The principal guest was also present was Mr Alderman Robert Finch, Senoir Alderman before the Chair. Deputy Pauline Halliday was also able to attend. Both were present when the Company received its Letters Patent, in fact they were the Lay and the Aldermanic Sheriffs at the time.

Other guests included the Masters and Clerks of the Hackney Carriage Drivers', the Management Consultants' and the Tax Advisors'. These are three of the four Companies awaiting Livery status.
